ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

Instituted on 15 August, 2006, Chanakya National Law University, Patna (CNLU) has emerged as a beacon of legal excellence in India and has evolved into a citadel of legal scholarship where intellectual inquiry, academic rigour and vibrant research culture together foster the grooming of social conscious legal professionals. Building upon Bihar's rich legacy as a cradle of knowledge production and legal education, CNLU distinguishes itself amongst the existing educational institutions in terms of its unwavering commitment to developing innovative practices in teaching of law through interdisciplinary approaches.

CNLU was established under the Chanakya National Law University Act, 2006 (Bihar Act No. 24 of 2006), and is duly recognized under Sections 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act, 1956. Situated within an educational hub in the centre of Patna, The University has a lush green campus and boasts of an impressive array of facilities and amenities, academic and administrative blocks with newly renovated smart classrooms, state-of-the-art accessibility lab, language lab, fast food outlets, basketball court and football ground. Well-maintained hostels for boys and girls are fully equipped with functional gymnasiums, while an advanced facilitation centre on campus accommodates a fully equipped health clinic. The University also provides a comfortable accommodation for teaching and non-teaching staff. *Nishant Nilayam*, the University library, plays a pivotal role in fostering academic and research excellence. It provides access to an extensive collection of digital and print resources, including Manupatra, Westlaw, HeinOnline, LexisNexis India, Corporate Law Adviser, Bar & Bench, AIR Database, Economic and Political Weekly, SCC Online, and JSTOR.

The University offers five-year integrated undergraduate B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) & B.B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) degree programmes; three-year LL.B. (Hons.) Programme; one-year Master of Laws (LL.M) program; and a two-year M.Sc. in Cyber Security & Digital Forensics Programme. The University also offers research programs such as Ph.D., D. Phil. and LL.D. In response to the changing realities of legal practice and societal expectations, the University's expanded undergraduate programme now offers a diverse selection of electives centered on current legal issues, empowering students to personalize their learning pathways. At the postgraduate level, the LL.M. programme features a comprehensive suite of specializations in the domains of Constitutional and Administrative Law, International Law, Corporate and Commercial Laws, Intellectual Property and Information Technology Law and Criminal Law. Complementing these are clinical courses, seminars, and optional modules in nascent and interdisciplinary legal fields. The University places strong emphasis on extra and co-curricular engagement, supported by a range of active committees, including the Legal Aid Committee, CNLU Pro Bono Club, Moot Court Committee, Literary and Debate Committee, Sports Committee, Parliamentary Debate Committee, Cultural Committee, among others.

Under the strong and visionary leadership of the Vice Chancellor, *Prof. Dr. Faizan Mustafa*, the University has further strengthened its capacity and commitment to foster academic innovation by emphasizing upon the interdisciplinarity in the study of law. Prof. Mustafa's constant focus on integrating scholarly literature from non-law disciplines in the teaching of law coupled with a vibrant calendar of seminars, workshops, specialized guest lectures, Conferences, Symposiums, etc., has created an intellectually stimulating environment for a student of law.

The University's flagship initiatives, including the Annual Parliamentary Debate Competition, the National Cyber Law Moot Court Competition, the Legal Aid Fest-*Vidhikta*, among others, are testimonies to the University's objective to nurture critical thinking, public engagement, and socially responsive legal education. Adding to the University's distinction is its accomplished alumni community. Graduates of CNLU serve as Advocates-on-Record before the Supreme Court of India; practice at various High Courts and subordinate courts, and contribute significantly to the Bar. Not only this, it would not be an exaggeration to state that CNLU alone has contributed to Indian Judiciary by producing over 300 judicial officers. The Alumni network boasts of encompassing eminent academicians, partners and associates in leading law firms, officers in the Indian Foreign Service and Indian Revenue Service, and professionals in the banking and corporate sectors. The network is spread across renowned institutions such as School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, University of Cambridge, University of California, Berkeley, and Leiden University in Netherlands, University of Southern California, Stanford University and Northwestern Pritzker School of Law. This further stands as a testament to CNLU's growing national prominence and its enduring impact on the legal landscape of India.

INSTITUTIONAL RANKINGS AND RECOGNITION

CNLU has secured notable positions across multiple national and international ranking frameworks. Nationally, the University ranks 17th in the NIRF 2025 law rankings, 12th among law colleges and 4th among emerging institutions in the India Today 2025 survey, and 35th in the IIRF 2025. Internationally, CNLU holds the 35th position in the Fortune 100 SDG Rankings and is placed 512th in the Global Graduate Career Outcome Rankings 2026. Additionally, Green Mentors, an organization closely affiliated with the ECOSOC (United Nations), has awarded the University a Gold category rating with a score of 90.2 out of 100, securing the 31st rank amongst all Indian universities. These accolades collectively affirm the University's steadfast commitment to academic excellence and its expanding global influence.

EQUALITY, DIVERSITY AND INCLUSIVITY

CNLU is rooted in the understanding that Law is a powerful instrument for social change. The University does not merely teach legal principles; it shapes graduates who combine legal expertise with strong ethical values and compassionate leadership. Its goal is to prepare professionals dedicated to building a fairer and more equitable society. Testament to this, in every batch, a significant number of students pursue their studies through scholarships offered by various government initiatives. This practice not only makes quality legal education accessible to meritorious students from diverse backgrounds but also reinforces the University's reputation as a genuine catalyst for transformative change. Academic resources include a well-equipped language lab designed to assist students in strengthening their English proficiency, while co-curricular sessions in foreign languages including German and Spanish are offered to enhance global connectivity and cross-cultural understanding. The physical infrastructure is fully disabled-friendly, ensuring barrier-free access and equal participation for all. To further support equity, an SC-ST Cell actively addresses the needs and grievances of students from underprivileged backgrounds, while a dedicated 'Laptop Committee' facilitates digital access, bridging technological gaps for seamless academic participation. The University is deeply committed to gender equality, transgender inclusion, and the mental well-being of its students with access to 24x7 online mental health facility. Its teaching, learning, and assessment methods are shaped by this inclusive philosophy, ensuring that every student receives equitable opportunities to grow and succeed. In addition to this, Safety and dignity are non-negotiable at CNLU. The Internal Complaints Committee, constituted in strict compliance with the University Grants Commission (Prevention, Prohibition, and Redressal of Sexual Harassment of Women Employees and Students in Higher Educational Institutions) Regulations, 2015, works proactively to prevent and address sexual harassment. It fosters a respectful environment, upholds gender harmony, and regularly conducts initiatives to empower women within the University. The

Restorative Justice Committee facilitates constructive dialogue among students in conflict.



RESEARCH CENTRES

The university provides a rigorous academic environment through its vibrant research centres and distinguished research chairs. Key centres such as the Child Rights Centre (CRC), Centre for Advanced Research on Corporate and Insolvency Law (CARCIL), Civil Services Study Centre (CSS), Centre for Innovation, Research and Facilitation in Intellectual Property for Humanity and Development (CIRF-In-IPHD), Chanakya Centre for Alternative Dispute Resolution (CCADR), Centre for Innovation, Incubation and Legal Entrepreneurship (CIILE), Centre for Law and Economics (CLE) and Centre for Research in International Trade and Investment Laws (CRITIL) and Cybersecurity and Digital Forensics Centre (CSDFC) actively engage with students and faculty members in various research and extension activities in their respective domains. The Panchayati Raj Chair, Govt. of Bihar and the IPR Chair, supported by DPIIT under the Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India have also been established at the University which foster collaboration among students, faculty, and governmental bodies to advance grassroots issues of local governance and intellectual property frameworks respectively. The Gender Resource Centre (GRC) at CNLU, established under the aegis of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) has organized several impactful programmes and conferences and created training modules for relevant stakeholders. CNLU has also entered into collaborations across State institutions to promote interdisciplinary learning. To this end, the University has signed MoUs with the Dashrath Manjhi Institute of Labour and Employment Studies, the Labour Resource Department, Government of Bihar, Bihar Police, and AIC Bihar Vidyapith. Additionally, CNLU's Incubation Cell aims at fostering entrepreneurial spirit by incubating more than 40 start-ups, providing practical experience in business incubation and management essential for students and budding entrepreneurs. The

university has also established partnerships through Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) with numerous national and international institutions, facilitating valuable opportunities for faculty and student exchange programs.

CNLU'S CONSULTANCY TO THE GOVERNMENT OF BIHAR FOR REGULATORY REFORMS

Chanakya National Law University, Patna contributed to Bihar's compliance-reduction and deregulation reform by preparing the **Draft Bihar Right to Business Bill, 2026** at the request of the Government of Bihar. The draft was submitted by Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor Prof. Dr. Faizan Mustafa to the Chief Secretary on 7 June 2026 in which a trust-based statutory framework for enterprise facilitation through self-declaration, affidavit-based approvals, deemed approvals, digital processing, and a Single Window System, was proposed. The law is designed to reduce compliance burden and approval delays while retaining stricter controls for high-risk activities involving fire safety, pollution, explosives, drugs, petroleum storage, hazardous industries, and other sensitive sectors. On the similar line, CNLU, Patna contributed to Bihar's Deregulation 2.0 reform by leading the drafting of the **Bihar Ease of Doing Business Bill, 2026** at the request of the Department of Industries, Government of Bihar. A drafting committee chaired by Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor Prof. Faizan Mustafa prepared the draft in consultation with concerned departments and stakeholders, submitted the draft to the Government, and participated in subsequent consultations with the Chief Secretary and other departments. The Bill, now placed before and passed by the Bihar Legislature, creates a legal framework for a Single Window System, an Ease of Doing Business Council, an Executive Committee, the Invest Bihar Secretariat, and District Empowered Committees, with time-bound approvals, deemed approvals, and structured appeals aimed at improving regulatory efficiency, transparency, and investment facilitation.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Chanakya National Law University is the first law University in India where a Chair has been established by the Government in the domain of Panchayati Raj. This Chair, inspired by Gandhi's belief in the primacy of popular voice, offers actionable policy inputs for effective local governance. The Child Rights Centre partners with the Bihar Government to train judicial officers, Juvenile Justice Board and Child Welfare Committee members, para-legal volunteers, civil society, and childcare institutions in child rights advocacy. Community outreach includes open lectures, symposia, and workshops, alongside legal aid services and active involvement in the National Service Scheme (NSS). The University further supports startups, MSMEs, and corporate enterprises, in line with the Start-Up India and Make in India initiatives.

RAGGING FREE CAMPUS

Ragging, a societal affliction, has no place at CNLU. The University has established a robust mechanism, including the office of Proctor, a Disciplinary Committee, and Anti-Ragging Committee & Squads, all operating in strict adherence to the guidelines and regulations set forth by the University Grant Commission.

CNLU LIBRARY AND RESEARCH RESOURCES



Law libraries are not mere repositories; they reimagine the law through interdisciplinary scholarship. The holdings at CNLU have been developed for this purpose. The Library offers an extensive body of Indian legal reports and reference materials, including the Supreme Court Cases, All India Reporter, Income Tax Reports, Criminal Law Journal, Patna Law Journal Reports, Law Commission Reports, Company Law Journal, SEBI & Corporate Laws, and Consumer Protection Judgments. International legal journals and reports include the Harvard Law Review, Stanford Law Review, Yale Law Journal, Law Quarterly Review, Modern Law Review, Australian Law Reports, Halsbury's Laws of England, and the United States Supreme Court Reports. Our analogue collection is matched in equal measure by the digital repository. We provide access to leading legal and interdisciplinary research platforms, such as SCC Online, HeinOnline Academic Core, JSTOR, Manupatra, LexisNexis Advance, Westlaw, AIR Online, Kluwer Arbitration Online, Kluwer Intellectual Property Law Online, Kluwer Competition Law Online, Economic & Political Weekly, Bar & Bench, LiveLaw Premium, and ONOS Journals. The e-book collections comprise works from major academic publishers such as Brill,

Bloomsbury/Hart, Cambridge University Press, Taylor & Francis, and Oxford University Press.

ADMISSIONS : UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMME (U.G.)

1. DIRECT ADMISSION TO FOREIGN NATIONALS AND NON-RESIDENT INDIANS (NRIs):

There are five seats for Foreign Nationals and five seats for Non Resident Indians (NRIs) for five year integrated UG courses (B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) and B. B.A., LL.B. (Hons.). Those who wish to apply for B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) or B.B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) against the Foreign Nationals seats need not take CLAT-2027 and may apply online to the University which would be made available later on the **University Website, i.e., www.cnlu.ac.in**. The candidates must be Foreign Nationals. Their merit shall be finalized on the basis of their percentage of marks in 10+2 / Intermediate or its equivalent. For the NRI candidates, admission shall be on the basis of CLAT-2027 score. In case of any grading system, the equivalent percentage shall be taken into consideration. However, they shall fulfil other eligibility criteria of CLAT-2027. The Minimum percentage of marks in 10+2/ Intermediate or its equivalent for admission to B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) or B.B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) course will be 45%. In case of tie, preference shall be given to higher percentage of 10th marks. In case of further tie, preference shall be given to the one with higher age. Further tie, if any, shall be done by drawing a lot.

Candidates who wish to apply under Foreign National and under NRI categories shall submit the online application form which will be made available on our website www.cnlu.ac.in with all supporting documents along with the one-time non-refundable fee of Rs. 10,000/-. The dates shall be announced later on our University website.

Selected candidates shall complete the admission process by paying required fees in full on the scheduled dates to be announced in the University website: www.cnlu.ac.in

The Candidates seeking admission against NRIs seats will be required to apply directly to the University in the prescribed format along with the supporting documents as per the notification to be placed on the University Website. The admission under NRI category shall strictly be made on the basis of All India Rank (AIR) of CLAT-2027. Candidates have to fulfil eligibility and criteria of CLAT-2027. For admission under the NRI category, candidate / the candidate's parents/either of them must be a Non-Resident Indian (NRI).

NOTE: Unfilled seats of the Foreign Nationals and NRIs shall not be filled in by any other categories.

2. FIVE YEAR INTEGRATED B.A., LL.B. (HONS.) AND B.B.A., LL.B. (HONS.) COURSE

The integrated 5-year B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) and B.B.A., LL.B. (Hons.) programs are open to students who have completed their 12 years of school education and have joined CNLU after clearing the CLAT examination. These courses offer integrated degrees in Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Business Administration and Law, involving the study of compulsory subjects and electives. In the arts/business administration cohort, students are required to study twelve foundational subjects and two language papers up to the third year. Law students, in accordance with BCI Regulations, undertake twenty-eight compulsory subjects, including four clinical subjects. Students must also select specialised elective courses offered by the University. This academic session, the University provides a catalogue of a wide array of elective papers in areas of Constitutional Law, Criminal Law, IPR, Technology and Commercial Law. These courses aim to deepen students'

understanding in their chosen legal field, fostering independent learning, improving research capabilities, acquiring problem-solving skills with critical thinking to enhance their career prospects. Below is the tentative list of subjects available at the University.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA:

A candidate for admission to the 2-Year Masters programme should have passed an Undergraduate Degree in any discipline / any other equivalent degree with the following Marks or Equivalent Grade:



Fifty-Five percent (55%) marks
in the aggregate of the maximum marks prescribed in the case of candidates belonging to General / BC / EBC / EWS / Especially Aabled Persons (SAP) and other categories.



Fifty percent (50%) marks
in case of candidates belonging to the SC/ST category.

The candidate must have passed/appeared in the final semester/final year examination of the qualifying degree on the date of the entrance test. However, the candidate who appeared in the qualifying examination must submit the final result on the date and at the time of admission.

ADMISSION PROCESS:

Admission to the M.Sc. CSDF programme shall be through an Offline Entrance Examination at the University Campus (Part A – 50 Marks) followed by Personal Interview (Part B – 50 Marks), with a total of 100 Marks. Part A comprises 50 Multiple Choice Questions of one mark each. The entrance examination is designed to assess candidates' foundational awareness across computer literacy, cyber awareness, legal aptitude, and analytical reasoning. The examination is kept at an accessible level to encourage applications from graduates of all disciplines.

DURATION OF THE COURSE AND SEMESTER SYSTEM:

- The duration of the course is Two Academic Years.
- Each Academic Year consists of Two Semesters, and each semester shall consist of a minimum of ninety (90) working days.
- The Academic Semesters are ordinarily from July – December and January – June, with winter break and summer vacations.

SCHEME OF STUDY

The schedule of first-year part 1 shall comprise Two Semesters, Semester I and Semester II. After completion of each semester, students will be required to undergo an internship program, based on which the students have to submit a project report.
